Orders will usually ship in 7-12 days. Order your tests now so you have them when you need them.

Code Compliance:

Public Safety:

Over the past week, 135 Public Safety incidents occurred in town, including the following:

Emergency and patrol incidents

- 9 medical aid responses
- 47 suspicious circumstance/security checks
- 2 responses for persons in crisis/welfare checks
- 52 traffic stops
- 2 responses for residential/commercial alarms
- 1 response for animal-related incidents
- 1 death investigation, no suspicious circumstances observed
- 1 motor vehicle collision
- 1 response for nuisance-related incidents (noise/party/etc.)
- 1 response for parking enforcement

Crimes against persons

- 1 incident of assault
- 2 incidents involving indecent liberties

Crimes against property

- 1 incident fraud
- 1 motor vehicle theft attempt

Over the weekend, Public Safety was dispatched to a suspicious vehicle stopped upon the ferry dock. On site review of surveillance video suggested the vehicle was purposefully parked at the location and intentionally abandoned. In consideration of the multiple highly conspicuous targets nearby, such as the Special Commitment Center passenger ferry, the Pierce County vehicle ferry, and the Burlington Northern Railroad crossing, ferry personnel notified the U.S. Coast Guard for support. Public Safety also contacted the Pierce County Sheriff Hazardous Device Response Unit. While these efforts were in-progress, officers located the driver, who was suffering from mental health crisis. The incident was resolved without further issue. Ferry boarding was delayed during the event, and the railroad tracks through town were closed for over an hour, however no trains were delayed due to the closure.

Last week, officers responded to a report of a person suffering an apparent medical emergency. Our officers were on scene within 3 minutes of being dispatched and found the patient without a pulse and not breathing and began CPR. West Pierce Fire and Rescue arrived about 2 minutes later and assumed care of the patient. The phone call was made to 911 immediately upon the event having occurred, which means that we had healthcare provider level CPR being administered, followed by advanced life support care, within about 6 minutes of the event having occurred. Due to the efforts of responders on scene, the patient's pulse and breathing was established and they were transported to the emergency room for further treatment.

Last week, in cooperation with nearly a dozen police and fire partners through the county, Public Safety has joined into a group subscription for a countywide, comprehensive emergency notification system. Current plans are coordinating training and implementation of the new system, with hopes to go-live this spring.

A frequent question asked to public safety officers is when to call 9-1-1 versus the non-emergency number. According to our dispatch agency, South Sound 911, “Call 911 when it is an emergency and a prompt response is needed. Emergencies requiring 911 are life-threatening or a crime that is in-progress. Examples include a fight or assault occurring at the time, a burning fire or a possibly life-threatening medical problem.” More information can be found here: <https://tinyurl.com/2p9bs3ej>

Beginning January 1, 2022, drivers in Washington have the option to include disability and medical designations in the Department of Licensing driver license and identification card system. These designations can give first responders information about how you communicate or inform them that you have one or more conditions that might affect a health emergency. South Sound 911 announced their Emergency Health Profile program, which allows for crucial life-saving information to be automatically shared with 911 during call or text without saying a word. Information can include pre-existing medical conditions, disabilities, and allergies; behavioral health information; emergency contacts; and other relevant information about the caller or members of the caller’s household. Public Works:

Building Energy Efficiency/Replacement Project:

Air Systems Engineering primarily worked at the Community Center installing new heat pumps and controls. The work will shift to Town Hall in the next week or two.

Streets and Storm:

Crew Emphasis:

The crew concentrated on sign maintenance and repair; erosion control inspections; pesticide continuing education classes; right-of-way maintenance; and performing other maintenance activities.

Electrical:

Crew Emphasis:

The crew repaired a secondary service in the 100 block of Champion Street; assisted the Water crew with a water service leak on Cedar Street and a water main leak at Oak Drive; and performed other maintenance activities.

Water/Sewer:

Crew Emphasis:

The crew repaired a water service leak in the 200 block of Cedar Street and a water main leak in the 2300 block of Oak Drive; pressure washed the pump station facility and the Well #4 building; replaced an alternator switch at the dock lift station; and performed other maintenance activities.

Parks, Buildings and Grounds:

Crew Emphasis:

The crew treated roof tops, sidewalks, and parking lots for moss; commenced fruit tree pruning at Pioneer Park; cleaned up storm debris from trails, parks, and other facilities and performed other maintenance activities.

Other:

Little Free Pantry:

The Town of Steilacoom in partnership with the We Love Steilacoom Association and the Lakewood Rotary are sponsoring a Little Free Pantry at the Community Center. Stop by and drop a nonperishable food item off or if in need, pick something up.

We Love Steilacoom Association – Steilacoom Food Bank:

The We Love Steilacoom Association operates a food pantry/bank located at the Steilacoom Community Church, 1603 Rainier Street, Steilacoom, Washington, 98388. You do not need to be a member of the Church to obtain assistance through the Food Pantry.

Emergency Food Network – Home Delivery:

Since May 2020, EFN has expanded its services to include food delivery for people living in Pierce County who are high-risk or facing barriers to access their local food pantries.
